

President Report

By the time you get to read this issue of our battalion magazine, it will be less than a month to go before we commence coming together at our planned Cocktail Reception on Friday 21st April 2023.

Unfortunately, I have to report that at this stage, registrations have virtually stopped, and we have topped out at about a total of 200 registrations, which I find sadly disappointing after all the efforts of the Victorian Reunion Committee, who will present what I believe will be a very vibrant and rewarding experience.

Three years ago, upon my secondment into the role as your National President, based upon my naivety in suggesting our next reunion to be held in Melbourne, one of my first actions was to nominate that the reunion be held during the Anzac Day period, rather than our normal Long Hai Day commemorations which are held in February of each year.

As your President, I felt it my duty to represent ALL members of the battalion. As previously identified at least one-third of our membership served with 8RAR well before February 1969 when others like myself commenced training in preparedness to be shipped off to SVN in November 1969. And others were still attached to 8RAR after our return in November 1970 until 8RAR were decommissioned in mid-1972, upon the formal cessation of Australia's involvement in the war in South Vietnam.

Hence, I was aiming to have all our members who have solely served 8RAR in Malaysia and Australia with great honour and dedication, to have a chance for their "day in the sun" and gain some further recognition they deserve.

So, apart from having the opportunity to partake in our photographic exercise on the steps of the Shrine of Remembrance, then taking part in the Anzac Day March from Collins Street to the Shrine, they will gain the appreciation of the Australian public simply expressing them a "thank you for your service" because we are all Anzacs.

Upon further reflection, I have no idea of how much the Covid-19 closures over the past 3 years in Victoria has affected the reunion attendance, but other factors such as the cost of accommodation, and especially air-fares may have played a large impact upon our poor numbers for the reunion. The other main factor

may be simply that we are now another three years older, and possibly individuals have increased health concerns. However, be that as it may, it would be remiss of me not to mention the fantastic support I have received from my three other Reunion Committee members:

Lt. Col. Neil Smith (Retired) who has put together our Commemoration Service at the Shrine, as well as marshalling for our group photographs.

Wayne Maschette, who has done all our organisation and videos for our visit to Phillip Island and the National Vietnam Veteran's Museum.

Bruce Lankford who served with 8RAR in Malaysia, who is the manager in charge of both the Cocktail Reception and Battalion Gala Dinner.

Thank you, gentlemen, for all your assistance and support, and I trust all the delegates to this once off April reunion will be able to fully appreciate all your efforts, simply by taking part in all the functions we have arranged.

Finally, for those unaware of the process, we have planned for the Sunday 22nd April at the Beer Deluxe, to hold our Annual General Meeting, after which a Special General Meeting will be held to discuss primarily our Future Directions proposal.

Furthermore, at the Special General Meeting it will be announced that in conjunction with the 8RAR NSW Branch our next reunion will be held in Sydney NSW in February 2025, and Ray Richardson has been nominated as your next President. As such, I wish Ray the very best in taking the role as your next President, and I feel the seasoned 8RAR members of the NSW Branch will produce an excellent program.

Looking further down the track we have the annual Long Hai Commemoration Service at The Shrine at 1145 on Sunday 26th February 2023. The format will be similar to past years with some extra consideration of and discussion on the conduct of our Reunion Commemoration Service which is scheduled for Saturday 22nd with the Gala Dinner that evening. Also, two years ago, it was suggested that as part of the Long Hai Commemoration Service the names of those Battalion members known to have died over the previous two years would be read out during the service, so this is the intention this year. If anyone objects to this, please let the writer know and the matter will be further considered.

Returning the **National** Reunion to Commemoration Service, for your planning purposes please note that participants will be asked to assemble at the city end extremity of the Shrine Lower Forecourt, near St Kilda Road and the entrance to Government House, at 1030. For those who can march – remember it is a taxing climb for some, the group will form up with our banner and step off at 1100 behind the Rats of Tobruk Pipes and Drums - so there is no excuse for sloppy drill. Those who can't march can join the parade after it has formed up in front of the Eternal Flag and the seated guests and spectators. Be advised the activity is filmed and can be seen on You Tube and elsewhere, so look your best and tell family and friends to have a look. A standard service will follow with components such as a formal Welcome, Shrine Welcome, Speaker/s, National Anthem, Prayer, Wreath laying, The Ode, Last Post, Silence, Rouse, Poem, Honour Roll and Closure. The parade having Fallen Out in situ, everyone will be invited to refreshments from the Salvation Army between the three main flags and Birdwood Avenue. Don't forget to give the Salvation Army folk a gold coin for their support. When invited, groups will need to assemble on the Shrine steps for photographs. Following refreshments and photographs everyone is encouraged to enter the Shrine which is a magnificent building and suited to the reflection of our military sacrifice and service. Whilst not a museum per se, the displays in the Shrine are world class and should be seen. Take the opportunity if you can. There are guides about the place. Just a brief word on the Melbourne ANZAC Day March. It is too early to detail form-up areas in the CBD but the March is similar to those most have experienced elsewhere. Note that it is a lengthy route, down Swanston Street, then along St Kilda Road and finally the longish rather demanding climb up the aforementioned forecourt to the Shrine, past the Eternal Flame (which always receives an Eyes Right and Front). Just before reaching the Shrine steps the column wheels off as directed and falls out in the nearby grounds. Now, for those with mobility issues, please do let us know so that arrangements can be made. Cars and the like are usually provided by the RSL but are limited in number.

After ANZAC Day and the National Reunion the Branch will hold the usual mid year luncheon, this time at the Ringwood RSL on 25th June 2023 starting about midday as usual. For the Battalion birthday the Frankston RSL is the venue once again, this time on 6th August while the final end of year function will be at the Glen Waverley RSL on 26th November 2023. Make sure they are in your diary.

Finally a few wise words from yesteryear. The only thing more accurate than incoming enemy fire is incoming friendly fire. Another one - make it tough for the enemy to get in, and you won't be able to get out.

Finally, hot of the press. Regardless of what you might read elsewhere, the fact is that 63,718 Australian Defence Force members served in the South Vietnam conflict, with 18,807 being National Servicemen – not the 15,000 or so which is commonly reported.

This is part of their address.

Three of our old boys were killed in Vietnam; the 1st boy ever to enrol at our school, Allan Ahearn who died 14th May, 1970, Harry White who died 16th May, 1968 and Bernard Garland who died on 23rd April 1970. Also we remember that 83 boys (39 as conscripts) served in Vietnam.

SO NOW WE MOVE ON TO MELBOURNE.



2790191 Anthony John (Tony) KINGDOM, born in Manilla NSW on 20 May 1947. A National Serviceman served with 8RAR in Malaysia and then Vietnam (A Coy) from 17/11/1969 to 11/03/1970.

His Funeral was held on Wednesday 1 February 2023 at the Acacia Function Centre, Tamworth NSW, followed by a Wake and Tribute at the Manilla RSL.

"It is with sadness that I announce the passing of Tony (Poss) Kingdom of A Company 8RAR on the 26th January 2023 (Australia Day)

The funeral service was held at the Acacia Function Centre Tamworth at 10,30 am Wednesday 1st February 2023. It was attended by many Dignitaries from the townships of Gunnedah, Curlewis, Manilla and Tamworth. He was friends with everyone.

A good sprinkling of 8RAR Vets including Bill Babs, Peter Molloy, Keith Sleeman and Les Wicks attended as well as many ex-service members from around the district who saluted a former Digger.

Poss's Army Career started when he was called up for National Service and presented himself to Marrickville Army Depot on the 1st May 1968 as part of 12th intake. From there he travelled to Kapooka for Basic Training and then to Singleton NSW for Infantry Corp training, He was then sent to Malacca Malaysia where he spent 6 months on Duty after which he returned to Australia and was based at Enoggera QLD, after extensive jungle training at Canungra he was posted to South Vietnam where he served with Distinction before being seriously wounded in the mine incident in the Long Hai's on 28th February 1969. Something he never fully recovered from but never complained about.

Tony's daughter Rebekah read the heartfelt Eulogy and then his Granddaughter, Emmielle read a stirring tribute to her grandfather - not a dry eye in the house.

At the end of the service those attending milled around outside telling stories and jokes on his life before moving off in a cavalcade of cars to Manilla Ex-Serviceman's Club for the wake - where a few bevies were sunk all the while stories were being told.

Tony was a great mate and friend over many years but could not tell a good joke if his life depended on it.

His Funeral Service was held at the Gin Gin Lawn Cemetery on Monday, February 13, 2023








Dick was a proud Wakka Wakka man. He was a Corporal with 6 Platoon, B Company in Malaya 68-69 and Vietnam 69-70.

Remembrance Day 11 November 2022 Coorparoo RSL and Community Club (Ray Raines)

I'm a member of the above club and on Remembrance Day on behalf of the club obtained The Commissioner of the Queensland Police Katarina Carroll as our guest speaker.

I did a presentation on the conclusion of the Service as it was the 60th anniversary of Australians involvement in South Vietnam.

I purchased 6 sets of Vietnam Medallions (you can see in the photo with Katarina and I).

I dedicated the Medallions to the police that were conscripted via the National Service – during the Vietnam War "Conflict".

I told the story of 2 of the young police who served in with 8 RAR in C Company.

- (a) Alan "Buzz" Rumbsy served in Malaysia.
- (b) Barry Stephens served in Vietnam.

They served as 2 I/C 8 Platoon C Company 8 Battalion. These two served with distinction and honourable soldiers.

On the call up for National Service, the Australian Government mandated that one and all their employer re-enstate them in the work force after serving their 2 years in the military. Alan and Barry went back to the police force. Were they were out of jungle green's to navy blue uniform. For many from one war zone to another. They excelled in the police force. Alan took his life many years after while serving in NSW. Barry, Viet Cong could not get him it took cancer. A great loss to their families and 8 RAR. Those that knew them to serving with them can confer.

Also, another non-NSW man who was a 2IC in Malaysia with 8 Platoon C Coy 8 RAR Jim Barrett. Jim took – applied for discharge, leaving the ranks

of 8 RAR prior to 8 RAR's deployment to Nui Dat South Vietnam, I spoke to Jim and asked him what is he going to do in civi street? Answer if I was 2 inches taller (he stood tippy toe) I'd most probably join the police force.

8 RAR deployed to Vietnam and on 8 RAR's arrival at the task force who was in greens waiting, Jim Barrett. Jim was allotted to A Coy. We know his fate was on Operation Hammersley, 28 February 1970. About 15 months later Jim's sister Margaret gave birth to a boy. Margaret and he husband Barry named the new born James (James Corliss) after Jim. In my talk at the Remembrance Day Service, I spoke of this episode also, and noted to Katarina that James is a Senior Constable waiting for promotion to Sergeant. He is holding ground at Lowood Police Station Old.

Now back to the Vietnam Medallion graphics displayed with them.

Men and Women of Bravo Coy!

On behalf of Vera and myself, I would like to officially welcome you all here today to this Long Hai lunch and to this reunion!

I would just like to say a few words in relation to this special day for us as members of 8 RAR bearing in mind, it is not a glorification of war but merely a recollection of an event that was part of our tour of duty in a war we fought in regardless of the politics of it!

It was 53 years ago today on the 28th of February 1970 that a Platoon of Alpha Coy walked into a minefield in the Long Hai hills near the end of Operation Hammersley, which was a massive Battalion operation trying to seek out and destroy the enemy with mixed results. Although it is correct in saying that history will show that every Battalion that went into the Long Hai hills had the same result as the enemy was far too entrenched in their bunker systems!

Most of us in Bravo Coy were oblivious to this incident as we were busy chasing D445 further north during which time another horrible, sad day happened on the 6th of March when 5 Platoon lost John Bressington and Snow O'Dal with many others severely wounded including our Platoon Commander Phil Thompson in yet another mine/booby trap incident!

After we came home and the 8 RAR Association was formed it was decided to honour this day as being significant in our tour of duty when we also honour all of the 18 men, we lost KIA in our tour! So, every year we gather mostly in capital cities to reflect and honour those who never made it home and also those who were wounded both physically and psychologically!!

It's funny about Australians that we sometimes honour battles or campaigns that we lost as we never really won in the Long Hais because we never routed the enemy out of their Minh Dam Secret Zone from where they rested up between operations against us! We never won at Gallipoli either! Maybe that is the Australian way

of 'cheering for the underdog'! Although, we all know that we are honouring the dead and maimed from that particular operation, regardless of the outcome as the operation was significant in the future course of our war!

However, history will also reflect that the leaders of our military personnel in those early wars had little regard for the lives of those beneath them. Fortunately, tactics have changed and man has become more cognisant of his fellow man and the value of Life! To that end, 8 RAR was extremely fortunate in having 'Peggy' O'Neill as our CO and it is a well-known fact that he always wanted to preserve the lives of his men and not put us in unnecessary danger with the odds stacked against us. 18 KIA in the whole tour bears testimony to his tactics which in essence, were that he stopped us from walking into bunkers systems in the jungle and getting cut to pieces by an entrenched enemy! Rather later on in the tour, we started to fight smart by ambushing around villages with good results and nil carnage for us!

As a Nasho, I was one of around 55% of us who made up the full complement of the Battalion who were blooded very quickly and efficiently into a world totally foreign to most of us! We soon learned that war was very real no matter how big or small the conflict is! When someone wants to kill you, it's very real and scary and not the same as playing war in your backyard with your other 'baby boomer' mates back in safe old Oz!

The thing is we adapted very well and molded into the Battalion very easily as we mainly had excellent Officers and NCOs guiding us and it got to the point that no one could tell the difference between us and our Regular soldier mates!

I know that we are **all** proud Veterans! Proud to have been part of the Grey 8th and even prouder to have served with Bravo Company, otherwise we would not be here today mixing with the very men who 'had our backs' every minute of every day we were "In Country"! The mateship we have is second to none, as is the mateship every single Veteran in every unit in every theatre of war Australia has been in!

I made the mistake once of saying, under the influence of a strong cordial, that the closest people in my life were my 8 RAR, mates! Upon reflection, I should've said the 'equally' closest people! Maturity! Comes late for most males!

When you live constantly with men during a time of war, there can be times of upsets and stress but I believe B Coy bypassed most of that mainly through excellent training, excellent leaders, excellent fellow Diggers and most of all – humour!! I often reflect on how much nonsense myself, Meags and Bluey Lee got up to in the Dat, which, I believe, must've contributed to keeping the Company morale up!

Speaking of Leaders, we were blessed to have, in my opinion, the best Company Commander in Mike Jeffery who sadly passed away in December 2020! His wife, Marlena sincerely had to sadly decline our

invitation to attend today as she had a huge plumbing problem in her home while she was away and tradespeople cannot give her a definite time to repair it so she has to stay local!

Beneath Mike was a small band of Platoon Commanders who were also second to none and today we have three of them with us, which tells me that they love the Company and its men just as much as we do even though they went on to serve in other Units with distinction after our tour!

Then we had the backbone of any Infantry Battalion in the NCOs and in particular the Section Commanders and when I had to do the job in 5 Section after Al Walter went home, I quickly realised how 'shit scared' one can get with so much responsibility on your shoulders! We have quite a few of these men here today as well! Of course, the real backbone of any Infantry Battalion is the Diggers, the Grunts, the Private Soldier who carries out instructions and tasks which sometimes appear to be beyond their capabilities without question and they did it to perfection! Well done everyone!

A good mate of mine in Jeffery Mawkes who was the number 2 on the gun with Hero in 5 Section, sent me a couple of T-shirts with poignant messages on them which read — "We went as Strangers and came Home Brothers" and "Not everyone who went to Viet Nam came home and not everyone who came home, left Viet Nam" Enough said! The aftermath of war can be quite debilitating for Veterans depending on their personal experiences and personality type! However, we are blessed, I believe, to have very good support from DVA no matter what colour the Government is on the day and I am confident that everyone here has had that support and is in a position to cope with life now as best he can!

In finishing I wish to acknowledge those who have passed since coming home and the numbers are gradually increasing sadly! So, I don't need to remind you to think of these departed souls every now and then! Fortunately, we are still here! We are proud Bravo Coy 8 RAR Veterans and hopefully, we will continue to meet up like this and catch up from time to time somewhere!

This brings me to sincerely thank a few people for helping me make this happen! First and foremost, my dear wife, Vera! I can't thank you enough love and you should know that without your help and support, I would not have been able to get through as well as we did! Thank you so very much, Darl! On top of this Ted Forward and Peter Ball have contributed with their specialties!

Thanks for your attention and for making the effort to travel to Bendigo so that this reunion would be the success it has been! Apologies were received from Marlena Jeffery, Bluey Lee, Jeffery Mawkes, Cyril Elliott and John Cleary!

On behalf of Vera and myself, I hope you have enjoyed yourselves as well as the rest of your day here and in Bendigo and if you wish to go through the Military Museum in town, Peter (Yakka) Ball will be only too pleased to speak to you about making that happen! On behalf of Vera, myself, and the RSL staff, I also wish you safe and trouble-free travel back to your respective homes and loved ones!

We left our shores in '69, not knowing our fate at the time.

We were young and spirited, full of life.

This journey of ours would lead to strife.

The day had come to say goodbye, from airports and wharves the flag did fly.

Family and friends showed us much love, with tears in their eyes they looked above.

As the jets flew past, with such a roar. Would it be the last time they saw, their sons, brothers, fathers leaving for war?

As distance gathered between them and us, we looked at each other "Why all the fuss?!" Heading to a land far away, to an unknown war to this day.

The Reg's, the Nasho's together as one, carrying their packs and a brand-new gun.

After days at sea and hours in the air, we finally arrived glad to be there.

Looking in amazement with what we saw, this was the beginning of our tour.

As we moved to our base at Nui Dat, armoured vehicles to our back.

The war was near it could be seen; I heard a bang the truck did lean.

"How close was that?!" my mate did say, his safety re-assured without delay.

On arrival at Base Nui Dat, settled into my new flat.

Metal bed, metal locker, this old tent was a real shocker!

Wooden pallets for the floor, mouldy sandbags around the wall.

Home from home let's not complain, the mud, the heat and continuous rain.

14 days in country the task at hand, operations in Phuoc Tuy over a vast land.

The initial patrols were 5 days long, the Hamlets, the bunkers around Hao Long.

Protecting the farmers during the day, ambushing at night without delay.

Six months in country and operations grew long, five weeks at a time chasing Viet Cong.

Day after day the hardships abound, the killing and wounding, the shouting out loud.

Patrols continue around Xuyen Moc and Dat Do, the pain and suffering of mates I know.

Back in the lines another op complete at last a beer in my hand and weight off my feet.

It doesn't last long that's for sure, 10 days later back for more.

As the months go on nothing has changed, home soon hopefully can be arranged.

With casualties mounting and unrest at home, this television war can't leave us alone.

11 months in my tour I lost mate after mate, 18 in total, this war I do hate.

The day has come the news is here, 350 days in country and the end is near!

Finally, to leave this god forsaken place, the excitement could be seen on everyone's face.

We had served our "country" as requested, we fought and toiled and never rested.

By air and sea, we left for home, together as one and never alone.

We were brothers in arms to say the least, the mates we lost,

May they rest in peace.

On arrival home no words (of war) were spoken, some battered, some bruised with spirits broken.

Family and friends gave us support, with little knowledge of the war we fought.

With pain and anger in my heart, I longed for the day and a fresh new start.

Lest we forget.

"To live in the present, negates the past."

2023 marks 60 years since the arrival of the Australian Army Training team (AATTV) in South Vietnam (SVN) on 3 August 1962 – and 50 years since the withdrawal of combat troops in 1972.

Calling volunteers to visit all 523 Australian Vietnam KIA graves

Here is an opportunity for all of us to assist the Vietnam Veterans Vigil (VVV) and get involved in this very worthy cause. If you can assist your State Branch in visiting any of our men who paid the supreme sacrifice, please contact them.

The ACT Branch have for many years under the leadership of their former President the late Wilf always gather at Philip Richter's grave on Long Hai Day and this tradition continues with Tony and is very commendable.

The Australian government intends to mark the occasion with a Commemorative Service, televised nationally by the ABC on 18 August 2023 from the Australian Vietnam Forces National Memorial (AVFNM) in Canberra.

Many Vietnam Veterans and the next-of-kin of KIAs are too old or frail to attend this ceremony.

To account for this, the Vietnam Veterans Vigil (VVV) will provide surviving Vietnam Veterans and the Australian people the opportunity to participate in other meaningful ways right across the nation and overseas in recognising the national loss and paying their respects to those who were Killed in Action (KIA) and to show solidarity with their loved ones for their loss.

It is intended to hold a Service of Remembrance at every grave or Commemorative plaque site across the nation and overseas on 3 August 2023.

The first being a Dawn Service Dawn Service, to be held at the AVFNM in Canberra.

Other Services will be held at 11am local time across Australia and in Malaysia.

The last Service, at Dusk, will be held in Scotland, where LCPL Robert Buchan is laid to rest with his Mum and Dad.

VVV is asking for volunteers to co-ordinate each Commemorative Service.


